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Introduction to Hosea

Author: Hosea, the son of Beeri

Date of Writing: Between 755 and 725 B.C.

Purpose of Writing: To remind Israel (and us) that Our God's loving covenant with His people is unwavering.

Practical Application:

- Hosea shows us of God's unconditional love. But it is shows us how God feels when His Children sin.
- When we do sin, if we repent God, will bring us back and show His never-ending love to us (1 John 1:9).
- As we remember all God has done for us in Christ we will rejoice and obey the One who give us eternal life instead of the hell we deserve.



The Prophet Hosea

The Prophet Hosea & His Wife Gomer

- Gomer was the unfaithful wife of Hosea the prophet.
- God gave Hosea an unusual command: "Go, marry a promiscuous woman...for like an adulterous wife this land is guilty of unfaithfulness to the Lord" (vs. 1:2).
- After bearing 3 children, Gomer left Hosea to live with another man. But God Commanded Hosea to buy her back (3:1)
- The Lord used their relationship to show how God remains faithful even when His people don't (2:19–20, 14: 4 7).



Hosea & Gomer

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Read Hosea 5

- 1. What values had replaced love for the Lord in the hearts of Israel's leaders?
- Worldly Values: They have taken on the "dog-eat-dog", "every man for himself" mentality" (vv.1 2, 10).
- Immoral Values: Their lack of Godly values moved them act in immoral ways toward themselves and others (vv. 3 5)
- Material Values: They sought after wealth and possessions, instead of seeking after God (vv. 3 – 4)
- Humanistic Values: The leaders instead looking to God, looked more human power and solutions (vv. 4, 6, 13)



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2. Consider recent news, both national and international. How have bad leaders trapped the common people (cf. v. 1)?

Note: "The image of fowlers trapping birds in nets and snares may be the origin of this common metaphor (see Josh 23:13; Ps 69:22; Is 8:14)"

- National Traps: Runaway spending by both parties (Rep & Dem) has trapped our nation with inflation and economic turmoil.
- International Traps: Conflict between Russia and Ukraine has trapped the world and on the brink of nuclear war.



"When the righteous thrive, the people rejoice; when the wicked rule, the people groan..." (Proverbs 29:2)

- 3. Israel made some attempts to seek the Lord (vv. 4-7). Why were their attempts not successful?
- <u>Unrighteous Deeds:</u> Their acts of disobedience (sins) kept them from seeking after God in true worship.
- <u>Unrighteous Hearts:</u> The "spirit of prostitution" was still in Israel's heart (v. 4); they hoped God could be found in Baal worship.
- <u>Unrighteous Examples:</u> Because Israel did not have their hearts toward God, they influenced other members of God family to disobey as well.



Note: When people try to create a god who does what they want, the God of the Bible will be repulsive to them.

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- 4. What further warnings did God give to Israel and Judah in verses 8-12?
- Confirmation Of The Warning: The Warning of God's impending Judgement is loudly proclaimed and confirmed.
- Correction In The Warning: God lets His people know that this correction comes from a just and loving God.
- <u>Compensation For Rejecting Warning:</u> God affirms this judgment is due to continued sin and disobedience.



The wrath of God is being revealed from heaven against all the godlessness and wickedness of people, ... since what may be known about God is plain to them... (Romans 1:18 -19)

- 5. What difference would it make if God's judgment were not certain(v. 9)?
- <u>Difference In Our Perception Of God:</u> If God isn't true to His word, He and the His Word would be untrustworthy,
- <u>Difference In Our Actions Toward God:</u> We would never change our sinful and destructive behaviors.
- <u>Difference In Hope Of Redemption From God:</u> God is faithful to His promise to judge, we can also trust Him to restore.



"God is not a man, that He should lie, Nor a son of man, that He should repent. Has He said, and will He not do? Or has He spoken, and will He not make it good?" (Numbers 23:19)

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- 6. Where did Israel go to try to find a substitute for God's help (v. 13)?
- Worldly People: Instead of joining with God's people in prayer, Israel went to the godless Assyrians.
- Worldly Authority: They looked to the king of Assyria and his authority instead of the King of kings who has all authority.
- Worldly Solutions: They looked for worldly solution to their pain and problems and found no help (cf. Luke 8:43).



"I will lift up my eyes to the hills—From whence comes my help? My help comes from the Lord, Who made heaven and earth." (Psalm 121)

- 7. Where do many of today's leaders turn for powerful help as a substitute for God?
- Might: They turn to using their own might (weapons, violence, power...) to force people to their will.
- Methods: They turn to dishonest and often unwise procedures instead of looking to the Lord in prayer.
- Money: Leaders often turn to unrighteous money to bribe and cover up sinful behaviors instead of looking to God's justice.



"Do not put your trust in princes, in human beings, who cannot save; Blessed are those ... whose hope is in the Lord their God." (Psalm 146:3, 5)

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- 8. What comfort do you take from the concluding words of chapter 5?
- <u>Comfort In God's Purpose:</u> We take comfort that God does afflict pain without purpose to bring us back to Him.
- <u>Comfort In God's Providence:</u> He has already provided a solution that will be for our good and His glory.
- <u>Comfort In God's Promises:</u> While God will judge us for our sins, He promised to never abandon us and will keep the door open.



"...the God of all grace, who called us to His eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after you have suffered a while, perfect, establish, strengthen, and settle you." (I Peter 5:10)

Keys For Living

- As Christians (especially Christian leaders) our values and actions must be driven by our love for the Lord and our love of other.
- If we are going to truly seek the Lord in worship and prayer, we must first have a pure heart and right motives.
- Even when the Lord needs to correct us for our sins, we can always find hope – knowing that He will forgive and restore.



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
